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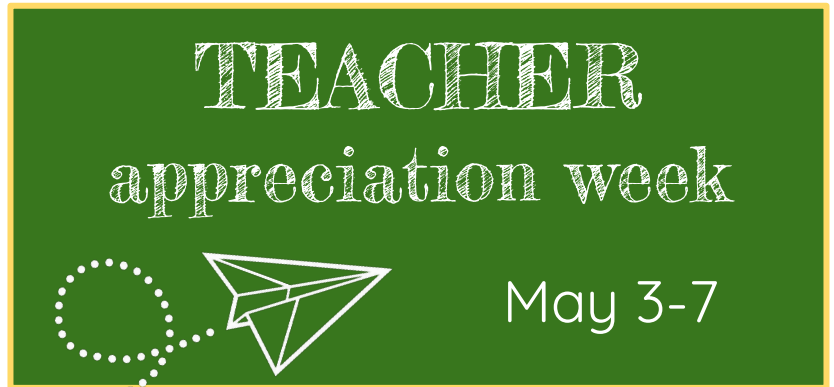

This month, please meet Genesee Hill's one and only, Craig Garretson!

What is your current role at GH?

I serve as support staff for our K-5 Access program, and for the school as a whole.

What drew you to this type of work?

Beginning in college, I discovered an increasing enjoyment in helping other people grow and learn. While this started in church settings, I also worked with kids off and on throughout my (younger) adulthood alongside my work as a professional singer. Between this and seeing my wife work as a bilingual I.A. for three years, I felt that Special Education could be rewarding and stepped into my first classroom in 2007!

What is your favorite part of your work?

I love finding ways to adapt a lesson or concept in ways that different learners can engage with. (Touch Point math rocks!) One highlight was a Genius Hour a couple of years ago, where I led a small group art lesson on creating an expressionist painting together. ADVOCACY & EQUITY

The WA legislative season just wrapped up a week ago and below is a heads up on some of the bills that were passed that are of interest to WA public elementary schools. The bills are all now sitting on Governor Inslee's desk.

SB 5092- Operations Budget- 2021-2023

1.7 billion dollars is coming to WA schools to aid with their reopening plans and address learning loss. A capital gains tax on WA's top investment earners will generate a 415 million gain for WA, and much of this revenue will be used for early education programs.

SB 5030- Developing comprehensive school counseling programs

School counselors will be required to spend 80% of their time on student services, not on administrative tasks.

SB 5128- COVID 19 and school transportation funding

Normally public school transportation funding is based on student ridership. This became a problem with remote learning. This bill proposes a new formula for use in emergencies, where districts apply for additional funding and use older data to calculate ridership and therefore adequately fund school transportation.

SB 5044- Concerning professional learning, equity, cultural competency, and dismantling institutional racism in the public school system

This bill aims to add equity, diversity and inclusion to the public school system by giving anti-racism training to school board directors and staff.

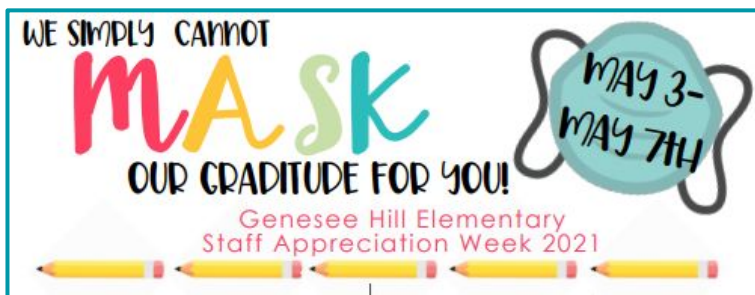
HB 1476- Addressing enrollment declines due to COVID

The state intends to provide stabilizing funding to districts that have seen temporary enrollment declines due to COVID. This bill also gives districts some flexibility with school levies.

What is happening with the Dandelion Initiative this year?

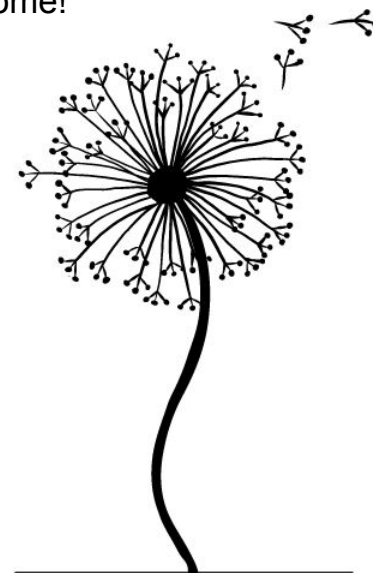
[The Dandelion Initiative](#) is still plucking dandelions!

As you may recall, the initiative began in the spring of 2019 to coordinate weeding and put focus on our lovely landscaping that was choked by weeds. Beautiful native plants were put around our school when it was built, but no budget was set aside to maintain the plantings. A few of us parents created the initiative, quickly pulling in Erin Munavu, a 1st grade teacher. We had several very successful weeding and mulching events, Study Club and classrooms got involved, and we could see our plants again!

With the onset of Covid lock downs, Dandelion as an initiative went dark and we canceled all our spring 2020 weeding events, including an Earth Day celebration. But invasive plants continued to grow, and people continued to weed! Many school neighbors and families came by the school on their own schedule, and piles of plucked weeds accumulated, ready to be picked up. Maybe weeding was a nice ritual for folks tired of being stuck at home!

We are slowly starting up again, and a few dedicated volunteers worked to clean up the front part of the school for the first day back in-person. Thank you, volunteers!

Who are CHAMPSS? What do they do at Genesee Hill?

CHAMPSS stands for *Connection Heart Advocate Mentor Proactive for Student Success*. These paraeducators provide recess monitoring and classroom support. About 6 CHAMPSS work around 15 hours a week each. This group is trained to tutor all students in all subject areas. Since they have a flexible schedule, CHAMPSS are able to provide quick daily tutoring that interventionists aren't able to provide. They are currently helping with the return back to school and keeping the safety protocols in place, such as monitoring the number of students in bathrooms and common areas. They are the extra set of hands when a teacher or staff member needs them.

In order to specifically fit our school's needs, CHAMPSS are trained in-house. For example, last year Ms. Frazzini worked with those specifically assigned to Kinder and 1st on how to deliver phonics interventions. Ms. Dunn works with them for morning "check & connect" needs. In past years, Assistant Principal Henn worked closely with CHAMPSS assigned to the green room on ways to help kids with emotional regulation and how to help kids on the playground work through conflicts. Many CHAMPSS move on to become IAs at the school.

CHAMPSS are funded 50% from the PTA budget and 50% from the school budget. Our current CHAMPSS are Jennifer Hill, Amy Taylor, Tara Calvo, Ellen Bannon, and Terry Gilioli. You probably know them by face, if not by name!
